Grace and peace!

When I moved here, one of the things that surprised me was the emphasis on ancestral heritage. Where I grew up,



ancestry was not all that important. I don't remember talking with friends about where our ancestors came from in Europe. My home church had a Lutefisk dinner, but that was the only overt connection we had to a cultural heritage.

Toward the end of this month, we will spend a lot of time thinking about heritage, but not heritage as our culture defines it. On the last Sunday of this month, we will celebrate Reformation Sunday. We will celebrate our religious heritage as people who believed the Church needed to be re-formed and trusted the Holy Spirit to do so. We continue to remember that heritage as we pray for the Spirit to reveal to us now the ways that we need to be re-formed as people of God, and we pray for help trusting the Spirit to make us new.

The next week, the first Sunday of next month, we honor the saints, especially those saints who have entered the Church Triumphant. We reflect on all the ways they have shown us who they knew God to be, and what it means for us to be people of God. We are invited to get to know more ancestors of the faith as we read scripture and get to know those ancestors.

While it can be fun to discuss different family heritage traditions, let us never forget our truest heritage does not come from genetics or family trees, but from our place as God's children. Our truest heritage is not German or Finn or Swede or Italian or even American, but our truest heritage is beloved children of God, redeemed by Jesus Christ, and made new in the Holy Spirit.

What's in a color?

In October, we continue the long green season. We will use the green paraments for the season after Pentecost, a season in which we focus on growing as disciples. It is sometimes called "ordinary time." The final week of October, we celebrate Reformation Day. We dress the church in red (and we are all invited to wear red as well.) It's one of only two days of the year we use red. The other is Pentecost. On both days, we use red to remind us of the work of the Holy Spirit. On Pentecost, we remember the Holy Spirit *forming* the Church, and on Reformation, we celebrate the Holy Spirit's work of *re-forming* the Church.

A Walk through a Worship Service

In the transition between the "Word" and the "Meal" parts of the worship service, we have space for an offering. Sometimes this offering is collected during the worship; following COVID it has more often been collected in the narthex as you enter or leave worship. But we take time to pray over our offerings at this time. It follows the sharing of the peace and precedes the sharing of communion. Our ancestors in faith chose to collect an offering for the poor in connection with communion as they could not imagine sharing in communion without also remembering the needs of the community, and especially the most vulnerable in the community.

It is important as we pray over this offering collected that we remember our offerings are offerings of tangible resources, like money, but also offerings of our time and our abilities. When we pray over these offerings, we are giving thanks for all the abundant gifts God has given us, and we pray for wisdom and discernment in how God is calling us to share our gifts with the world God so loves.



All Saints Sunday is coming up the first Sunday in November. We like to give special honor to those saints who have died this past year, since November 1, 2023. If you have a family member or friend outside Zion or Salem that you would like to remember, please contact Pr. Nicole with their names, and if appropriate, a picture. Like last year, all are invited after the service to a fellowship time where bulletins from past funerals will be available. At this point, you may bring a funeral bulletin from any year to share in our remembrance.



Our Supper and a Service return this fall! Feel free to join us on Wednesdays at **5pm** for supper and a worship service in the Salem Fellowship Hall. All are welcome.



Kids' Club has resumed! But there is always room for one more. Join us on Wednesdays at 3:15 for an after-school time of learning and growing as children of God.

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod,

I have heard it said, "If nothing ever changed, there would be no butterflies." What I hear in this quote is the promise of better, the hope of beauty, and the surprise of blessing that can come from change.

Our world, our society, our climate, our culture, our Church – all are in the midst of change, transition, and maybe even transformation.

But we are not so keen on change. People like to sit in the same pew, go to the same place for coffee, sit in the same place at the dinner table, observe traditions and rituals that give order, structure, and meaning to our days. Sure, we might rearrange the furniture or put up new curtains, but these changes are of our own making. We choose the change and we can change it back if we want to. It's when changes are imposed upon us that we may balk, resist, or resent what another has decided or how the flow has shifted.

No one decided that the Church or culture should change, but it has. And because I believe the Holy Spirit knows how much we resist change, we, as the Church, are being pushed in a direction that we would not go in willingly but is God's will nevertheless. So here we are, and already I see the promise of better, the hope of beauty and unexpected blessing.

In July, 27 lay people who provide preaching in their own and neighboring congregations met for as Preaching Seminar. The goal was to further equip them for the ministry they are already doing - using their gifts in ways that perhaps would

not happen if there were enough pastors to go around. These gifted, spirited, and conscientious leaders invested their time and effort to learn more in order to do better. Efforts will continue to support and equip lay leaders and preachers for the work of ministry alongside pastors and administrative interims.

I see congregations becoming more collaborative, partnering together with neighboring congregations for ministry and education, supporting each other, becoming more aware of each other, learning from each other.

I see us becoming more mindful of the work of the Holy Spirit in our midst. Our classes on spirituality, prayer, and discernment offered through Lifelong Faith Formation continue to be well attended. I see a heightened tolerance for discomfort as people have the courage to engage in conversations around race, politics, gender issues, and more. More and more, people in our congregations are lowering their defenses to learn something new. Book studies, the Kaleidoscope Challenge, and study of ELCA social statements provide ongoing opportunities for deeper engagement and conversation concerning issues that do not have a sound bite answer.

I am proud of us..for the innovation I see, the resilience, the adaptability, and the commitment to ministry and congregational life, even in the face of uncertainty and civil division.

Be aware that in our world, and in our congregations, anxiety can present as anger, negativity, and a desire to blame or demonize when really there is no one to blame. Change is simply happening. And our calling as disciples of Jesus is to respond in a way that is life giving, compassionate, and in alignment with Jesus' command to love God and neighbor.

Change is afoot...even in the Synod office. Courtney Wehmeier, our Synod Office Administrator for the last year, was accepted into a graduate program in Leeds, England to pursue a degree in Marketing Analytics. Her last day was in July. Pastor Jim Duehring, our Assistant to the Bishop and Director for Evangelical Mission for the last six years, has joined the ranks of the retired as of August 31. As of this writing, the search for new staff continues.

In the meantime, Betsy Koski, our Synod bookkeeper and fill-in-the-gap-gal, and myself will do our best to meet the demands of Synod ministry. And of course, in this staff transition, there is opportunity. Perhaps circumstances will necessitate inventing a new way of doing things. Perhaps we will be blessed with new staff that provide unique perspectives and a skill set that we didn't know we needed.

Whatever the future brings - in our country, in our world, in our congregations, in our synod, God is at work...in you and your community of faith. Together, we will strive to respond to change in a way that proclaims that we are disciples of Jesus and children of God, united in mission and planting seeds for future hope, beauty, and blessing.


